
A Long Winter's Nap By Carolee Dean



A Note to Teachers and Parents

The Bears Who Inspired the Poem

"A Long Winter's Nap" is a parody of "A Visit from Saint Nicholas" by Clement Clarke Moore. The story may seem humorous and fanciful, but it depicts a very real and dangerous situation that occurs too often in bear country. Bears seek out warm places to hibernate for the winter. If a crawl space underneath a house is not secured, a bear can easily enter through a small opening and stay there until spring. Bears usually hibernate all winter, but not always, and if they wake up, the first thing they will do is look for food. They can also cause thousands of dollars in damage by destroying gas pipes, water lines, duct work, and insulation.

The poem was inspired by real bears, Hank and Henrietta, but the story is not intended to depict any one particular bear, home, or location. Check out my book <u>Hank the Tank: Animal in the Spotlight</u> to learn how Hank was blamed for home invasions committed by Henrietta and her cubs. In the summer of 2022, authorities captured Henrietta and she was taken to live at the Wild Animal Refuge in Springfield, Colorado. Her story is an exception. Hundreds of bears are euthanized every year when they are determined to be a "nuisance."
